Philip Ferguson is Professor in the College of Educational Studies at Chapman University, and past President of the Society for Disability Studies. His research focuses on history of disability, family/professional interactions and support policy for people with intellectual disabilities, and qualitative research methods in education. He is the author of *Abandoned to Their Fate: Social Policy and Practice toward Severely Disabled Persons, 1820-1920*, and co-author of *Away From the Public Gaze: A History of the Fairview Training Center and the Institutionalization of People with Developmental Disabilities in Oregon*.
